

Water



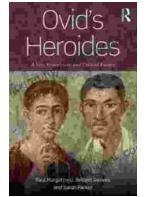
